

WE PROCLAIM THE WORD OF GOD

Reader A reading from the letter of St James.

Every generous act of giving, with every perfect gift, is from above, coming down from the Father of lights, with whom there is no variation or shadow due to change. In fulfilment of his own purpose he gave us birth by the word of truth, so that we would become a kind of first fruits of his creatures.

You must understand this, my beloved: let everyone be quick to listen, slow to speak, slow to anger; for your anger does not produce God's righteousness. Therefore rid yourselves of all sordidness and rank growth of wickedness, and welcome with meekness the implanted word that has the power to save your souls.

But be doers of the word, and not merely hearers who deceive themselves. For if any are hearers of the word and not doers, they are like those who look at themselves in a mirror; for they look at themselves and, on going away, immediately forget what they were like. But those who look into the perfect law, the law of liberty, and persevere, being not hearers who forget but doers who act—they will be blessed in their doing.

If any think they are religious, and do not bridle their tongues but deceive their hearts, their religion is worthless. Religion that is pure and undefiled before God, the Father, is this: to care for orphans and widows in their distress, and to keep oneself unstained by the world.

James 1.17-end

This is the word of the Lord.

Priest Listen to the Gospel of Christ according to Saint Mark.

Now when the Pharisees and some of the scribes who had come from Jerusalem gathered around him, they noticed that some of his disciples were eating with defiled hands, that is, without washing them. (For the Pharisees, and all the Jews, do not eat unless they thoroughly wash their hands, thus observing the tradition of the elders; and they do not eat anything from the market unless they wash it; and there are also many other traditions that they observe, the washing of cups, pots, and bronze kettles.) So the Pharisees and the scribes asked him, 'Why do your disciples not live according to the tradition of the elders, but eat with defiled hands?' He said to them, 'Isaiah prophesied rightly about you hypocrites, as it is written,

"This people honours me with their lips, but their hearts are far from me; in vain do they worship me, teaching human precepts as doctrines."

You abandon the commandment of God and hold to human tradition.'

Then he called the crowd again and said to them, 'Listen to me, all of you, and understand: there is nothing outside a person that by going in can defile, but the things that come out are what defile.'

For it is from within, from the human heart, that evil intentions come: fornication, theft, murder, adultery, avarice, wickedness, deceit, licentiousness, envy, slander, pride, folly. All these evil things come from within, and they defile a person.'

Mark 7.1-8, 14-15, 21-23

This is the Gospel of the Lord.

Praise to you, O Christ.

Following the Gospel, the priest invites the parents, Godparents and those to be baptised to gather at the front of church. The priest then addresses the parents:

What do you ask of the Church of God?

Parents We ask that this child may be baptised.

What name have you given your child?

The parents tell the priest the child's name.

The priest continues:

The baptism of its new members is an occasion of great joy for the Christian Church. By water and the Spirit, we are reborn as God's children, and are made followers of Christ, members of his body, the Church, and inheritors of the kingdom of heaven. Will you accept these things for [N]?

Parents We will.

In asking for [N] to be baptised, you are accepting the responsibility of bringing them up as a Christian. In caring for them, will you help them to keep God's commandments by loving God and neighbour as Christ has taught us? Will you pray for them, and draw them by your own example into the community of faith?

Parents With the help of God, we will.

The priest addresses the godparents:

Will you support and help [N]'s parents in doing these things?

Godparents With the help of God, we will.

The priest addresses the whole congregation:

Will you welcome [N] and do your best to uphold them in their life in Christ?

All With the help of God, we will.

The priest addresses the parents and godparents:

You have declared your wish for [N] to be baptised. We therefore now invite you to respond to Christ's call.

Do you turn to Christ? I turn to Christ.

Do you repent of your sins? I repent of my sins.

Do you renounce evil? I renounce evil.

Almighty Father, you sent your Son into the world to destroy the powers of darkness. Hear our prayer for these children: deliver them from evil, give them light and joy and fill them with your Holy Spirit, through Jesus Christ our Lord.

All Amen.

THE SIGNING WITH THE CROSS

By his cross and precious blood, our Lord Jesus Christ has redeemed the world. He has told us that, if any want to become his followers, they must deny themselves, take up their cross and follow him day by day.

The sign of the cross is made on the forehead of each child who is to be baptised.

[N], I sign you with the sign of the cross and claim you for our Saviour Jesus Christ.

When all the children to be baptised have been signed with the cross, the priest continues:

Never be ashamed to confess the faith of Christ crucified.

All Fight valiantly against sin, the world and the devil, and remain faithful to Christ to the end of your life. Amen.

THE PROFESSION OF FAITH

The priest addresses the parents and godparents:

We invite you now to profess the Christian faith.

Do you believe in God the Father, the Creator of all? I believe and trust in God the Father.

Do you believe in his Son Jesus Christ, the Saviour of the world? I believe and trust in God the Son.

Do you believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the Giver of life? I believe and trust in God the Holy Spirit.

The priest addresses the congregation:

This is the faith of the Church.

All This is our faith.

We believe and trust in one God,
Father, Son and Holy Spirit.

The priest leads the baptismal party to the font and the congregation turns to face them.

THE BLESSING OF THE BAPTISMAL WATER

We give thanks to you, O God:

All we bless your holy name.

For your gift of water to nourish and sustain all life:

All we give you thanks and praise.

Through the waters of the sea you led the children of Israel from slavery to freedom:

All we give you thanks and praise.

At his baptism, your Son Jesus was anointed with the Holy Spirit:

All we give you thanks and praise.

Through the power of that same Spirit, sanctify this water that your children who are washed in it may be united with Christ in his death and resurrection. Cleanse and deliver them from all sin; bring them to new birth in the family of your Church and make them inheritors of your kingdom: through Jesus Christ our Lord whom, by the power of the Spirit, you raised to live with you for ever and ever.

All Amen.

THE BAPTISM

The priest takes and baptizes each child by name, saying:

[N], I baptize you in the Name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit.

All Amen.

The priest may anoint the child on the crown of the head with Chrism, saying:

May God, who has received you by baptism into his Church, pour upon you the riches of his grace. As Christ was anointed priest, prophet and king, may you daily be conformed to his image.

All Amen.

THE GIVING OF THE LIGHT

The priest or a member of the congregation may give a lighted candle to each of the newly baptised.

You have received the light of Christ; Walk in this light all the days of your life.

All Shine as a light in the world to the glory of God the Father.

THE COMMISSIONING OF NEW STEWARDS

The Acting Dean, standing under the Majestas, says:

The life of this Cathedral aims to reflect the attitude and values of the Gospel of Jesus Christ who is Lord of all. Stewards have an important role in the offering of hospitality and welcome, in extending the friendship of this family under God, to all who seek him here. It is therefore appropriate to offer thanks and praise as we commission new Stewards, and to ask God's blessing upon them.

Those to be commissioned as Stewards come forward.

The Churchwarden says:

Canon Jan, I present to you these candidates to be commissioned as Stewards of this Cathedral.

The Acting Dean addresses the candidates:

Will you strive faithfully to fulfil your duties as a Steward of this Cathedral, and to discharge the responsibilities entrusted to you?

They reply together:

I will, the Lord being my helper.

The Acting Dean says:

I hereby commission you as a Steward of the Cathedral.

When all have been admitted, the Acting Dean says:

Almighty God, you enabled our forebears to build this Cathedral to your glory that it may be a witness to your power and love. Hear our prayer for all your faithful people, that in their vocation and ministry each may be an instrument of your peace. We ask this through Jesus Christ our Lord and Saviour.

Do this every time you drink it to remember me.'

Together we remember that Jesus is always with us and say:

All Christ has died. Christ is risen. Christ will come in glory.

Father, as we remember your Son, Jesus Christ, who died on the cross and rose again, we offer you these and all the gifts you freely give to us.

Send your Holy Spirit to be with us and all who share this bread and drink from this cup. Help us to trust you, bring us closer together and welcome us, with all your people, into Jesus' glorious kingdom.

All honour and glory belong to you, Father, through Jesus, your Son, with the Holy Spirit: one God, for ever and ever.

and the glory for ever and ever. Amen.


We Share The Gifts



Organic September!

Organic September is a month-long campaign designed to encourage more people to try organic food. Why choose organic?

- 1. Better for the planet: If Europe's farmland all followed organic principles, agricultural emissions could drop by 40-50%.
- 2. Higher welfare for farm animals: Organic farming has the highest animal welfare standards of any international farming system.
- 3. Better for nature and wildlife: 41% of Britain's wildlife species have declined since 1970. Intensive farming practices, including pesticide use, have been identified as the main driver of these declines.
- 4. Better for people: Fewer pesticides, fewer additives and preservatives, no GM ingredients, reduced use of antibiotics, more resilient farms.
