Order of Service



We are delighted to welcome you to this service at your cathedral, which has been a site of Christian worship for over 1,500 years. If you are joining us for the first time, please introduce yourself to a member of clergy, who will be happy to tell you more about worship in this place.

Since earliest Christian times the word Eucharist, which comes from the Greek word for 'thanksgiving', has been used to describe the sacrament that Jesus Christ instituted at the last supper. In faithfulness to our Lord's instruction to 'do this in remembrance of me' the Eucharist was accordingly regarded as an essential part of worship in the early church and today it remains the central liturgical activity of the baptised.

The text of the readings and the psalm can be found in the weekly notice sheet. Everything else is contained in this booklet. Please join in with the singing of the hymns, as well as the text printed in **Bold**. The rubrics (indicated with the '§' symbol) indicating when to *stand* and *sit* are only suggestions. If you are more comfortable remaining seated throughout the service, please do so.

Please join us for refreshments in Prebendal House after the service.

Communion

Everyone is welcome to forward to receive communion or a blessing. Please follow the direction of the stewards during Communion. You can indicate to the priest that you would like a blessing by keeping your arms lowered.

For hygiene reasons, it is our custom at the Cathedral not to dip the Host (bread) in the Chalice. If you feel uncomfortable receiving the wine from the chalice, you are not required to do so. Communion is received fully if you take either the bread of the wine.

Gluten-free wafers are available at the Communion. If you wish to receive one, please ask a steward in advance.

Sunday School

§ The Psalms of David are hymns of praise found in the Old Testament: The text for the psalm can be found in the weekly service sheet. We say the psalm for the day together.

The Gospel

§ Please stand. The reading is taken from one of the four Gospels, which tell us about the life and teachings of Jesus. As the Gospel is processed to the Nave, we sing together:

The Baptismal Creed

§ We stand to declare what we believe as Christians through the words of the Creed (from the Latin word 'Credo', meaning 'I believe'). These sentences represent the responses we make to the questions asked of us during the Baptismal Rite.

All I believe and trust in God the Father, who created all that is.

WE OFFER THANKSGIVING

§ At the Thanksgiving, we give thanks for all that God has done for us. We sing the Sanctus, a hymn of praise derived from the Prophecy of Isaiah and the Gospel of Matthew.

Let us give thanks to the Lord our God.


All It is right to give our thanks and praise.

It is always right, wherever we are, to thank you and to praise you, God our Father and King for ever, through Jesus Christ, your Son.

Through him you made us and the whole universe. When your Holy Spirit came to Mary, Jesus was born as one of us. He loved us so much that he died for us; on the first Easter Day you raised him to life; and death and evil were conquered for ever. At Pentecost, you gave the Holy Spirit, as Jesus promised, to help us to live as your children.

So here on earth, with the angels and archangels and with everyone in heaven we praise your name and sing:

§ We then hear the 'words of institution', the words spoken by Jesus to his disciples during the Last Supper. We then remember his death, his resurrection, and the promise of his return. We also ask the Holy Spirit to bless the gifts that we are about to receive at Communion.

Father in heaven, listen to the prayer we make in Jesus' name; through the Holy Spirit's power, gentle as a dove, may this bread and this wine be for us Jesus' body and blood.

Father, we remember when Jesus had supper with his friends the night before he died, he took the bread; he thanked you, broke it, gave it to his friends and said:

'Take this and eat it – this is my body, given for you. Do this to remember me.'

After supper, Jesus took the cup of wine; he thanked you, gave it to his friends and said:

'All of you drink from this cup – because this is my blood – the new promise of God's love:

Do this every time you drink it to remember me.'

Together we remember that Jesus is always with us and say:

All Christ has died.
Christ is risen.
Christ will come in glory.

Father, as we remember your Son, Jesus Christ, who died on the cross and rose again, we offer you these and all the gifts you freely give to us.

Send your Holy Spirit to be with us and all who share this bread and drink from this cup. Help us to trust you, bring us closer together and welcome us, with all your people, into Jesus' glorious kingdom.

All honour and glory belong to you, Father, through Jesus, your Son, with the Holy Spirit: one God, for ever and ever.

§ We say together the prayer that Jesus taught his disciples:

Let us pray with confidence to the Father:

All Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy name, thy kingdom come, thy will be done, on earth as it is in heaven.

Give us this day our daily bread.

And forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive those who trespass against us. And lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil.


For thine is the kingdom, the power, and the glory for ever and ever. Amen.

We Share The Gifts

§ The priest breaks the bread:

We break this bread to share in the body of Christ.

- Though we are many, we are one body for we all share in one bread.
- § We sing the Agnus Dei, which is based on the words of John the Baptist when he saw Jesus:



Jesus is the Lamb of God who takes away the sins of the world. Happy are those who are called to his supper.

Lord, I am not worthy to receive you, but only say the word and I shall be healed.

§ Those who wish to may come forward to receive communion or a blessing. Please follow the direction of the stewards. You can indicate to the priest that you would like a blessing by keeping your arms lowered. For hygiene reasons, it is our custom at the cathedral not to dip the Host (bread) in the Chalice. The following words are used at the distribution:

The body of Christ. **Amen.** The blood of Christ. **Amen.**

§ Once everyone has received Communion, we stand to sing the Last Hymn:



All Be still, for the presence of the Lord, the Holy One is here; Come bow before Him now with reverence and fear. In Him no sin is found, we stand on holy ground; Be still, for the presence of the Lord, the Holy One is here

Be still, for the glory of the Lord is shining all around; He burns with holy fire with, splendour He is crowned. How awesome is the sight, our radiant King of light! Be still, for the glory of the Lord is shining all around.

Be still, for the power of the Lord is moving in this place; He comes to cleanse and heal, to minister His grace. No work too hard for Him, in faith receive from Him; Be still, for the power of the Lord is moving in this place.
